Just in case you didn't hear or read about it, last fall we changed our name from the New Rochelle Humane Society to the **Humane Society of Westchester**.

When we began as the New Rochelle Humane Society in 1911, we cared for animals in New Rochelle only. But gradually over the years, we expanded so that now we do animal control and rescue for 19 communities in Westchester including: Ardsley, Dobbs Ferry, Eastchester, Elmsford, Greenburgh, Harrison, Hartsdale, Hastings, Irvington, Larchmont, Town of Mamaroneck, Village of Mamaroneck, New Rochelle, Pelham, Pelham Manor, Rye, Rye Brook, Scarsdale and Tarrytown. Our new name will ensure that residents all over lower Westchester County know that we are their animal shelter.

Though our name has changed, our commitment to serving animals has not. We have been, and will continue to be, dedicated to promoting the human/animal bond through the compassionate care and treatment of animals throughout the communities we serve in Westchester County, and beyond.

FROM OUR SHELTER MANAGER

What if you have your heart set on a puppy of a particular breed that rarely comes into animal shelters? For every pure breed dog there are what is known as "Breed Rescue Groups." You can search on-line or call HSW for referrals for breed rescue groups.



What if you have searched shelters and breed rescue groups, and you still cannot find that Great Dane puppy, and no other breed or mix will do? If you are going to buy that puppy you want to seek out a reputable private breeder. How do you find a reputable private breeder? What is the difference between a backyard breeder and a reputable breeder? Why would a reputable private breeder never sell their puppies to a pet shop? Here are some answers.

A good dog breeder breeds to improve their chosen breed. This means they are looking at not only the overall health of the dogs they choose to breed, but the temperament as well. A responsible breeder will have many questions for you. "Why do you want this breed?" "Where in your home will the dog be allowed to live?" Other questions they may ask are "Have you had a dog in the past and who was your veterinarian?" A good breeder wants to make sure you are aware of their breed's temperament traits and activity needs. They take not only great care in breeding the best puppies possible, but they also want to make sure the puppies they bred are going to live with families that will commit to quality care for the dog's lifetime. Just because you have the cash in hand to pay for a puppy, a responsible breeder will not sell you a puppy that they feel is not the right match for you.

Here are a few tips that will assist you in determining if you are dealing with a responsible breeder. They breed only one or two breeds of dogs and do not always have a litter of puppies available. They will have at least the mother, possibly the father too, on property and will encourage you to spent time with them. They will guide you in choosing a puppy from the litter, since they will know the personalities of each puppy.

It is critical that we educate ourselves to avoid supporting puppy mills by purchasing puppies from pet shops. Knowing how to identify a reputable breeder is critical. We at the Humane Society hope you visit us and consider our dogs first, but if you do not find your dog at a shelter, please follow the above information to find a responsible breeder and avoid supporting puppy mills.



FROM THE VET

Too many times we see animals adopted by loving families who are often surprised at the cost of veterinary care after adoption. With all the challenges facing our



pets these days, the regular fees for wellness visits, sick visits and parasite control can quickly overwhelm the average person. One mechanism that I have seen help people over and over is pet insurance. There are many providers out there, and some will cover up to 90% of the costs for veterinary care when your pet gets sick.

This is a viable option for managing the costs of pet ownership, and will allow a larger pool of adoptees to provide a forever home to one of our lovely animals. Your ability to afford high quality care will only enhance and extend the time you have together.

The May issue of Consumer Reports has an article about pet insurance, and goes into detail about three of the major plans.




HAPPY TAIL

cat was provided veterinarian care. Many of the cat suffered from long-neglected medical conditions. Fortunately, moneys donated for their care covered most of their medical care. Slowly most recovered, though sadly many had advanced cancers and long neglected medical conditions that were untreatable.

Over the past two years one by one the cats were adopted into loving homes. Kit was one of the cats that was rescued on May 20th. After arriving he, like most of the rescued cats, hid in the back of his cage for weeks because he was so fearful. Leslie, a long-time volunteer and pet professional, began volunteering daily to work directly with this group of cats. Orange tabby females are Leslie's favorite, and so she was immediately drawn to Kit. Unfortunately, adopting Kit was not an option since Leslie was not able to take another cat into her small home.

Over the past two years, Leslie became more and more bonded with the little shy Kit. So when one of Leslie's senior cats passed away after a long battle with cancer, there was room for just one more. Kit now spends her days sitting in those sunny spots on rugs and the backs of sofas.

HUMANE EDUCATION

In the last few months we have had over one hundred children from scout troops and school groups visit the shelter. They come from many of the communities we service. At the shelter they learn about us, why we have dogs and cats, and what we do to make their stay as happy as possible. They learn why our motto is "From Our Home to Yours." They learn about volunteer opportunities, get to interact with a dog, and take a tour of our facility They bring donations from our Wish List, toys they have made for the animals and money donations.



We have also visited two Temples to speak to children who need to do service prior to their Bar and Bat Mitzvahs. We have given talks to children at the New Rochelle Library and a Girl Scout house and we have gone to three schools, in Rye, Larchmont and Irvington. We speak about the shelter and have handed out over four hundred flyers letting their parents know that we are their shelter. We have also received Wish List donations from these places.

We think this is a win-win situation. Children get to learn about the care of pets both at the shelter and in their home, and we spread the word about our shelter so people will know where to come if their animal is lost or if they want to adopt one of our wonderful dogs or cats.



HOUNDS ON THE SOUND HARBOR ISLAND PARK, MAMARONECK

DOGS - MORE THAN JUST PETS II

Our Fall 2015 newsletter (see the Publication section of our web site: humanesocietyofwestchester.org) talked about dogs who, besides being used as an aid for the blind, which they have done for a very long time, are now being used for other important jobs. The article talked about dogs being placed in homes of people with emotional, behavioral and learning issues. The dogs are also placed in court houses, nursing homes, hospitals and anywhere extra love and kindness are needed.



Here are some new jobs for dogs. Dogs have been placed in areas to sniff out hazardous materials like those used in bombs. Senator Chuck Schumer said dogs could be used, in increasing numbers, at airports as a way to shorten waiting time by sniffing out items which cannot be taken a board planes.

An article in the paper recently entitled "Therapy animals help stressed students" describes animals and their owners who are visiting colleges during finals week, connecting with students who are tired and stressed out. There is growing research showing interacting with a dog can lower blood pressure and pulse levels elevated by stress.

PET STORES AND PUPPY MILLS

In our Spring 2014 newsletter, which you can find on our web site <u>www.humanesocietyofwestchester.org</u> under "About" and then "Publications," we wrote about the evils of puppy mills and the stores that sell these animals.

Last year when a pet store selling puppies opened on Mamaroneck Avenue in the Village of Mamaroneck many animal lovers were very upset. Contrary to what the owner claimed most, if not all, of the puppies sold in pet stores come from puppy mills, horrendous factories that breed dogs for profit. The breeding females spend their lives in cages and are bred as often as possible with complete disregard for whom she is bred with – father, son, or brother. This practice can cause genetic problems with her offspring who are then trucked to pet stores.

Many of you may have read about the truck filled with 70 puppies which spent the night in the truck outside of a pet store. The police who opened it said it was freezing inside and the cages were so small that many of the dogs could not stand upright. The owner was willing to leave them that way until the morning. Instead they were all taken to a Shelter where several required medical attention.

In addition to his link to puppy mills, the owner of the store in Mamaroneck had been arrested three times for animal abuse. People picketed outside the store, and the issue was promptly supported by Mayor Rosenblum who succeeded in having the Village Trustees pass a bill banning the sale of puppies not obtained from a Westchester shelter or rescue organization. The store on Mamaroneck Avenue closed soon after the bill was passed. Mount Pleasant quickly followed, passing a bill of their own. Over 100 cities have passed such a law in the United States including Detroit, Chicago, Los Angeles and Miami. New Rochelle is currently considering doing the same. It would be wonderful news if this happens.

Please do not buy a puppy at a pet store. Adopt one from a shelter, a rescue group or from a respectable breeder who cares about the dog's living conditions, and breeding and about finding good owners for their animals.

A VERY SPECIAL SHELTER DOG



Sweetums was adopted from the Humane Society of Westchester in June 2011, after being found as a stray, giving birth to 11 puppies and recovering from a broken hip. She became a perfect family member to her human siblings, feline siblings and many, many foster kittens.


