In May we rescued almost 70 cats from a hoarding situation and are now working hard to place them in forever homes. FROM OUR SHELTER MANAGER

On May 20, 2014 the New Rochelle Humane Society and Greenburg Animal Control removed almost 70 cats from a condemned home. Inside a small fly-infested, garbage-strewn room we found dozens of cats imprisoned in small cages. The cats



lived in the dark, except for a few minutes each day when one small light was turned on.

The first weeks after their arrival the cats were overwhelmed with the dramatic changes in their lives that they did not understand. They hid under blankets, cowered in the back of their cages and huddled with each other for comfort. It is times like these that we wish we could explain to them that they were safe and in good hands. We kept most of the cats in a quiet room that had soft natu-



ral sunlight to help them acclimate slowly to their new surroundings. Groups of volunteers and staff visited each day, sitting quietly in front of their cages. One of our volunteers brought a CD player to play soft music for the cats

Eventually the cats began to move forward towards an out-stretched hand. When they did finally make contact with us, they immediately began purring and leaning into our hands as if they just could not get enough. It brought tears to seasoned staff and volunteers to witness the transformation. Years of being confined to living in cages left the cats unsure about the big world beyond their prisons. As a result, when we would open their cages and give them the choice to leave, most were too terrified to come out

We now refer to this group as our Sunshine Cats: leaving a dark past behind and moving toward a bright future. Time, patience and the incredible support from people like you made this possible.

ASK THE VET

We are well into the "dog days" of summer, but there are still plenty of hot days left to warrant a brief discussion about the dangers of summertime for our pets.

First and foremost is the issue of traveling with your pets. If you must bring your dog or cat into the car with you, please do not leave them in the car while you get your errands done. The temperature in your car can rapidly rise to a dangerous level, even in just a few minutes. It is <u>not</u> OK to leave them in there, regardless of how quick you intend to be.

Secondly, the outside temperature can be just as dangerous for dogs and cats. Cats, luckily, tend to lie low in the heat, and seek shade. Unfortunately, dogs are often taken out in the heat to parks and beaches, and can't always find shade or take it easy, even if they want to. They can easily and rapidly overheat in these situations.

Both of these situations can lead to rapid illness, and if untreated, even death. If you must take your pet out, be aware of the temperature, bring plenty of fresh water, and avoid excesses of heat, sun, and activity. If your pet seems ill, remove him from the sun and heat and seek veterinary care immediately.

On a positive note, nice cool summer mornings and evenings are a great time to play with your animals, and get them (and us) some much needed exercise.

SUNSHINE CAT- Handsome

During the rescue described in Dana's letter, we were

told there was a mother cat with several small kittens in the garage. While searching for the family, we noticed an overturned cat carrier under some garbage. Inside the filthy carrier we found an extremely thin senior cat.

We shuddered at the thought of how long the cat had been in the carrier and worse, what would have happened if we had missed seeing the carrier.



Upon our return to the shelter, Keri, one of our part time staff members immediately bonded with this old guy that she affectionately named "Handsome". Handsome now spends his days snuggled in Keri's bed enjoying a forever home where he lives with Keri's other cats and dogs.



SUNSHINE CAT - Champ

Champ is in a foster home with Beth awaiting his forever home. This is what Beth said about his path to recovery.

"For two weeks he crouched in the back of his cage and hissed whenever approached. However, he liked to be petted,

and that's how his transformation began. First his head, then his body, then his belly and finally he came to the opening of the cage and bumped foreheads with me. After two weeks, he learned he was safe and decided to explore. Just stretched his legs and walked, something he hadn't done for years. The next day he ran, jumped up and looked out the window and started to play with toys. He forgot his trauma. He was reborn and now is a well-adjusted, normal cat. He loves to be held in your arms, always presents his belly for tickles, trusts and is confident. He has a name now. It's Champ. He's a survivor."

SUNSHINE CAT - Journey

Most cats were confined to small wire cages that they shared with up to four other adult cats. Journey lived for years with three cats in his cage (Champ, above, was one of them). Years ago Journey suffered a severe injury resulting in a badly broken leg which never received proper medical care. Consequently the leg healed in an extended position making it difficult to walk or simply lie down.

Funds raised through generous donations to the Help Heal Fund enabled us to provide Journey with an orthopedic veterinarian evaluation where they determined the best course of treatment was to surgically amputate Journey's leg.

Lee Anne, one of our board directors, fostered Journey in her home after his surgery. Without the malformed leg to inhibit his movement, Journey immediately began to move about, exploring his foster home and enjoying the attention of his foster parents.

Responding to Journey's story on our Facebook page, Kris contacted us about adopting him. Kris



has several cats in her home, including Oliver, a blind cat she had adopted from New Rochelle Humane Society. Journey joined Kris's household in June and Kris tells us that he immediately made himself at home.

WHISKEY

When Whiskey arrived at our door, we had to brace ourselves for what we were about to see. Seized from his home in Port Chester by Humane law enforcement officials, Whisky's collar had sawed a deep wound into his neck. A collar had been put on the dog when he was just a small puppy, and then it was never adjusted as he grew to a 60 pound dog, creating a deep four-inch wound in his neck! Neglect. A puppy tied in the backyard, fed, but not cared for.

Each day Whiskey was sedated to properly clean and wrap the gaping wound. Over the course of a month, the wound eventually healed enough so that we could suture it closed. Whiskey's wound has healed, though he will forever have a scar to remind us of the neglect he suffered in the past. Currently Whiskey is in our training program where we're teaching him basic manners and a few tricks just for fun.

Despite the obvious neglect Whiskey suffered, he remained sweet and friendly from the first day he arrived.
